The Sustainable Health & Wellness Village® Festival (SHWV) is a 3-day community-based health and wellness event that provides participants with ready access to healthcare and community resources within a culturally relevant festival-like atmosphere designed to promote meaningful engagements between communities of color and regional providers. Informed by the CDC's Social Determinants of Health and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation's Culture of Health Action Framework, the SHWV's innovative evidence-based model integrates acute care services and screenings with wellness education and lifestyle activities designed to address the full spectrum of determinants to overall wellbeing. To promote a safe and fun environment where important exchanges of value can take place, the SHWV employs targeted incentives, entertainment, and recreation activities that are thoughtfully designed

to appeal to each community's unique tastes. Each SHWV program is planned in close collaboration with the community's stakeholders from residents and local leaders to healthcare providers and business owners, ensuring that its custom configuration of community resources and activities reflect the needs and preferences of the communities we serve.

To optimize outcomes for participants and providers alike, the SHWV includes performance evaluations, combining hands-on data collection with automated analytics technology that provide insightful feedback shared among our partners to optimize our collective efforts and outcomes. This collaborative approach allows the SHWV to be a uniquely innovative, intelligent, and adaptive program that generates real value and elevates quality of life among underserved communities.




THE VILLAGE DESIGN

OUR COMMITMENT

The 2020 COVID-19 Pandemic has highlighted the long-standing inequities facing minority and low-income communities across the country. The disproportionate impact on these groups extends across the full course of disease from increased transmission rates to higher incidences of severe illness and death. These outcomes have devastated communities, illustrating the striking inequities of the existing public health infrastructure in these areas. The pandemic has exposed health disparities among black and brown populations as well as the broader fiscal and social consequences on society as a whole. Now elevated to the national consciousness, these challenges may hold opportunities to spur innovation and collaboration across sectors and industries that share vested interests in the health and social outcomes of urban population centers.

MEANINGFUL ENGAGEMENTS

Many elements of the **Sustainable Health and Wellness Village® Festival** (SHWV) make it
unique among community programs but at its
core, the *village* concept is nothing new. Over
thousands of years, people have relied on the
stability, security, and interdependence that the
village model provides to sustain their way of life.
The traditions and rituals established among close
knit groups serve to promote a shared sense of
unity, identity, and destiny. The practical and social
value of the village model has been proven the
world over – a model we recognize as an essential
community building tool.

The central objectives of the SHWV center around connecting underserved populations with quality community resources to promote optimal public

health and wellness outcomes. In many cases, this involves facilitating interactions between community members and the providers of local health and social services. Be it a one-on-one health screening or an expert lead group discussion, the adoption of healthy lifestyle behaviors often requires that community members forge new relationships with providers. The SHWV's planning process and ongoing support ensure that our providers are enabled to generate meaningful engagements with program participants in ways that foster trust, respect, and partnership. From this foundation, we aim to remove barriers, both real and perceived, and create access to quality community resources that advance the health and wellbeing of underserved communities.

MEMORABLE EXPERIENCES

Beyond just a literal event, the SHWV provides an experience that lives in the minds of each program participant. Complementing our community resource offerings is a wide array of entertainment, recreation, and cultural activities as well as quality gifts and prizes that generate memorable experiences of family fun, discovery, and connection. This festival-like atmosphere is central

to our engagement strategy as it creates the conditions for open and honest dialogue as well as powerful incentives for community members to participate. By presenting quality activities that celebrate the interests and identity of each community, we aim to inspire our participants to take full advantage of the opportunity to advance their wellbeing and quality of life.

A LASTING IMPACT

The unique environment, experiences, and impact of the SHWV take shape well before our event dates. With the expert oversight and direction of Caresparc Consulting, Inc., each SHWV program begins with an examination of the conditions in the prospective host community. We review each community's needs assessment, evaluate its existing community resources, and seek perspectives on the community's unique identity. Throughout our 9-month planning phase, we engage stakeholders from across the community to establish a cross-sector collaborative network that meets regularly to design and develop each program. Various planning committees made up of community members with distinct areas of interest lead the design of specific program features. In all, the aim of our planning process is to cultivate

strong partnerships and a shared understanding for each community's needs and opportunities.

Long after each SHWV event takes place, the network of community stakeholders we establish remains in place as an ongoing asset to the community. This network represents a valuable infrastructure that can be mobilized in response to emergent community needs as well as long-term opportunities. The power of this resource lies in the combined capacity of our partners and the relationships they have established but also their personal stake and shared interests in the outcomes of the community. OPPORTUNITY & ACCESS WITH HONOR

One of the hallmark features of the SHWV's custom community building approach is

The Veterans Resource Village (VRV).

This evidence-based specialized offering represents the combined efforts of deeply committed collaborative service providers, institutions, and employers that deliver targeted support to those who have served in our armed forces. Within this program, participants can participate in one-on-one consultations with specialized providers, join expert led educational forums, and secure relevant resources all within a safe, sensitive, and inclusive environment that encourages meaningful connections and fulfilling bonds among families, friends, and our broader community for years to come.

- ✓ We provide veterans with personalized guidance in navigating our valuable program offerings.
- ✓ We educate the broader community about the unique challenges facing returning service members and their families.
- ✓ We promote meaningful engagements so that veterans can explore new opportunities for quality outcomes within an integrated support network of providers.

The COVID-19 pandemic has changed all of our lives since 2020 but it has had a particularly





social conditions, black and brown populations have suffered serious illness and death from COVID-19 at rates nearly 3 times higher than those seen in white communities¹. COVID-19 has also disrupted public education and damaged local economies, which threatens the ability for these communities to meet even their most basic needs. Food insecurity is among the most difficult related challenges, with nearly 4 in 10 Americans being personally impacted since the pandemic began². This reality illustrates the critical importance of community-driven emergency preparedness and a coordinated response infrastructure.

To address the pandemic-related hunger crisis in Newark NJ, Caresparc Consulting, Inc. activated its existing network of corporate and community partners to produce the **COVID-19 Emergency Response Food Distribution Effort**. With the

assistance of its SHWV partners, the Caresparc team was able to develop and deploy a real-time response to Newark's hunger crisis only 10 days after New Jersey's shutdown orders took effect. Each week, the program's many volunteers sort, package, and deliver fresh produce and essential food items to vulnerable seniors and families throughout Newark. Since its inception in April 2020, the program has delivered over 1.4 million pounds of food to the homes of roughly 2000 residents. By serving the same local seniors and families week after week, the program is able to adapt to the community's evolving needs, proving itself to be critical to Newark's COVID-19 response and representing a vital bridge to the end of the pandemic for the city's most vulnerable residents.

New Jersey Give a Kid a Dream

The Gleason's Give A Kid A Dream Program

was established in 1991 to provide boxing instruction to at-risk children at one of the sport's most renown focal points, Gleason's Gym. In 2012, Jackie Atkins partnered with Bruce Silverglade, owner, to birth Gleason's Jersey Shore gym. Atkins combined the existing PAL youth program with a newly developed New Jersey Give a Kid a Dream *Champions of Life Program*, expanding the program to include academics and life skills.

- ✓ Jacklyn Atkins currently serves as President of the New Jersey Association of USA Boxing. She was inducted into the New Jersey Boxing Hall of Fame in November 2014.
- ✓ Give a Kid a Dream integrates the discipline of Olympic style boxing with fitness, life skills, counseling, mentoring, and academic achievement under one directive, and since its inception has left a positive impact on hundreds of children.





OUR SOUTH-JERSEY FESTIVAL HOST:

Atlantic City @ Oscar E. McClinton Jr. Waterfront Park

Atlantic City is a coastal resort city along the Jersey Shore, well-known for its casinos, boardwalk, and beaches. Its historical significance for residents and vacationers alike is reflected in countless books and movies, and even in the board game *Monopoly*.

Despite its many natural and man-made resources, Atlantic City has a large minority population that faces endemic challenges related to healthcare inequities and persistent socioeconomic hardship that negatively impact health outcomes and quality of life. In particular, Atlantic City's black and brown populations struggle with effective access and utilization of community resources. The elevated incidence and severity of chronic conditions like heart disease and diabetes in Atlantic City point to the persistence of lifestyle and behavioral risk factors. Cultural barriers and other social determinants among the region's minority groups likely complicate these health inequities, negatively

impacting health outcomes and diminishing quality of life.

The health and wellness challenges that exist among communities of color in Atlantic City highlight the importance of creative community programming that expands access to clinical care, public health, and social support resources within practical and familiar settings. The 2021 SHWV Festival will promote meaningful engagements between local community members and resource providers, building enriching and enduring relationships across cultural and social divides to advance public health outcomes and quality of life.

The 2021 SHWV Festival @ Atlantic City promises to be an important event, welcoming communities and organizations from across the city and throughout Atlantic County. Other host sites for the 2021 SHWV Festival season include Newark and New Brunswick.
